Labyrinth Lovers' Newsreel On Zoom introduced by Tina Christensen, creative arts psychotherapist and SoulCollage® facilitator, was a huge learning curve for the small team who embarked on that endeavour. We would have been floundering without Joy Bowles putting hours into teaching us how to use Zoom. The initial flurry of programs dwindled as participants became aware of how much of a commitment of time regular presentations required. But it is a valuable way of communicating and promoting the many aspects of the labyrinth that I hope will be carried forward by the new Council.

The training and experience gave confidence to the proposal to make the *Gathering in 2022* a hybrid event on Zoom and in person. 2020 ALN chair, marriage celebrant, Immanuel Creagh a member of the Classical Guitar Corner Academy and wife Viviana as treasurer, left a great legacy of organisation that was the foundation for the Gathering at Mt Carmel. Guest speaker, author of *The Labyrinth Your Path to Self-Discovery* and spiritual healer. *Tony Christie* has adapted his presentation to a live Zoom from Ireland plus a prepared presentation.

Louise Mason and I have corresponded with Chris Katzenmeyer of the Legacy Labyrinth Project and hopefully started the ball rolling out legacy labyrinths in Australia with interest generated with new owners of Campfire in the Heart at Alice Springs, the Dean of Brisbane Cathedral and Lorraine Rodda. I intend to remain with that team to help promote World Labyrinth Day through ALN members and in multi-media publications and Louise will be working even harder to promote World Labyrinth Day in Educational Settings for the 6th of May.

I am resigning as chairperson in 2022 aware that I could never achieve all I dreamed of in one year because there is always more to do for the endurance and succession planning of any NFP, and many more creative ways to attract others to the labyrinth path and sign up to become active members of ALN. But I feel I have fulfilled my promise of being a support person to the highly qualified and competent volunteers who have all ensured that ALN remains as vibrant and relevant as possible.

I think my most significant contribution is my article *Ariadne's Thread The labyrinth of our Body Mind* published in Pathways, the annual magazine of the TLS and now available under the research menu of the ALN web page.
